

Star

In Revelation definitely not meant stars – the planets seen on sky.

It is just like we use in our culture- film or TV star or so!

In biblical imagery, "stars" are symbols of angels; heavenly beings.

Rev 2:1- **seven stars** are the angels of the seven churches. Some students of Scripture identify these angels as heavenly beings who serve as guardians of the churches.

Rev 2:28 - *Jesus Christ is described as the 'morning star'*

Rev 22:16- *He identifies Himself as the 'bright morning star'*

Only Jesus' light is "bright" and self-existent. Satan may be a morning star, but he is only a poor imitation of the one true bright morning star, Jesus Christ, the light of the world. The first reference to the morning star as an individual is in Isaiah 14:12: "How you have fallen from heaven, O morning star, son of the dawn! You have been cast down to the earth, you who once laid low the nations!" (NIV). The KJV and NKJV both translate "morning star" as "Lucifer, son of the morning." It is clear from the rest of the passage that Isaiah is referring to Satan's fall from heaven (Luke 10:18). So in this case, the morning star refers to Satan.

Some verses imply that Satan coerced a third of these great beings to choose to submit to him and follow him in resisting God Himself as well as the outworking of His purpose in us.
